2. Develop awareness of objects and their environment in painting, and seeing this in the everyday world.
3. Create unity of surface on an entire rectangle of painting with uniform brush marks, considering the entire surface at one time.
4. Create a sense of volumetric form with value and color changes as well as utilizing open and closed edges.
5. Create a composition that actively incorporates points of the surface with uniform brush marks, color rhythm, and spatial relations.
6. Create a believable illusion of space in a painting.
7. Describe and analyze paintings by self, classmates, and works of previous masters using the language of the discipline.
8. Sketch directly on the surface with color, creating efficient activity within the format.
9. Develop light effects with color by observing three-dimensional objects accurately.
